PASTOR'S PEN

Guns and the God of peace

This month we've all witnessed yet another horrific mass shooting, this time in a Florida school. It raises the question, once again, "what is going on?" Why is it that our nation is so tragically plagued by these shootings and the offthe-charts gun violence that we see? For the Christian, where is God in all this?

Well, we've probably all heard of one particular theory that's making the rounds: the school shootings are taking place because we've pushed God out of schools. What do you think? Does that wash? Think about it: this theology would suggest that God protects children in schools as long as they have an organized, forced prayer time for all students. If not, it's open season on the kids! What a petty, vindictive and very small god that would be.

Luther made it clear that God is always at work in schools, governments and courthouses, working to make sure that people have protection and safety, that lives are nourished. And God works through and with people of all races, creeds and persuasions. This is true whether people believe it or not. So, the God we believe in does not walk away from us just because we didn't demonstrate a certain public religious practice that some Christians deem important. We don't control God so easily.

The bottom line is: God loves us and wants life for us! And so, God does everything God can to give us life and take care of us. This God is trustworthy! We can count on the God of the Bible. Luther said that sin is nothing other than misplaced trust, having faith in the wrong things.

Which brings us to this observation: our problems with violence, in my estimation, are due to misplaced trust and misguided values. Many Americans hold a tribal view of reality, which stresses that "my people" are good and that we are in a struggle against other tribes that are inferior or a threat to us—or both! Other tribes might be other faiths, other ethnicities, etc. It's an "us vs. them" paradigm. This value, or worldview, is contrary to what Christians hold, as we understand God working toward a unity of peoples bound by love, not fear.

But with a tribal view of things, we disproportionately value security and defense because protection of our tribe/family is paramount. Here's where misguided values lead to misplaced trust. We put our trust in something that will protect our tribe this worldview asserts, because the world is a fearful place. So a gun is necessary because the "other" cannot be trusted and the "other" is all around us. Over time, our thinking and imaginations get shaped by guns and tribal values. You begin to see the "other" more and more as a potential threat. When fear is fed, fear wins, and love goes out the window.

We live in a nation right now where we think and imagine reality differently than people in other countries. At least some do. This inevitably comes out in the behavior of some people, and in tragic ways. When our gods are security, guns and power, we are not living as God intended us to live.

I pray for our nation to ask the right questions about guns, rather than thinking we are destined to arm everybody to be protected from this Pandora's Box we find ourselves in. Our faith teaches us to work towards unity, diversity

Recently, we learned about dinosaurs and the children know quite a bit about them and the names of many of them. In the classroom we always have a toy bin of dinosaurs and the children play with them frequently. During dinosaur week, we had more dinosaurs out in the dra-

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Next time you're in church, take a look around at the people you're there with and think about the strengths and gifts that both you and they bring to Mt. Carmel.

Council did that as an exercise during our retreat in February. Led by Rollie Martinson, we each were asked what gifts we felt we brought to council—and, really, by extension, to the church. Then we shared that list with a discussion partner, and through that discussion, came to choose and share with the whole group the one dominant gift that we each bring to Mt. Carmel.

What our individual gifts are as a council isn't the point of this article, though they will become clear as this year moves along as we focus on using those gifts to move us forward. The purpose of that exercise was to help us get to know each other and to determine where and how we can best serve the goals council has, specifically relating to a primary goal of adopting and acting on the Strategic Plan.

Since it was announced, we've all struggled with the Strategic Plan. And the result is that very little movement on the areas discussed in the Strategic Plan. We as leaders have been asking why.

Conversations we've had both within council and also with some of you in the congregation helped us reach an understanding at the retreat: There's a sense of excitement over the Strategic Plan, but also frustration and anticipation over what the next steps or expectations are and when they'll come. And we, as leadership, haven't done a good job of communicating what the Strategic Plan means and how it needs to be acted upon by all of us in the church.

We recognized that the Strategic Plan is just that: a plan. It's a vision and set of guiding principles similar to the mission statement. It's a broad vision for what we'd like the church to do, and areas we'd like to focus on in order to do those things, but it doesn't spell out specifics of how to do those things. For a church that for decades has been built on direct instructions and expectations, the plan changes the game plan. So we need to define goals to help get us started on the path of implementing the plan. There's work to be done there.

We also realized that the Strategic Plan needs clarification. The language used is sometimes complicated and confusing. We'll revisit that and work to make it more accessible. With clearer language and some defined goals in place as we start work on implementing the Strategic Plan, we will get some traction and will achieve some recognizable results.

Finally, council understands that in order to lead Mt. Carmel into the journey we've laid out in the Strategic Plan, we need to actively consult with, support and communicate with all of you. We presented this to you and haven't really asked what we can do to help you do the work it expects. We've developed a plan to do this and will start that work very soon.

So what's the bottom line? We as the church council are reenergized and have a plan to lead the church forward into implementing the Strategic Plan. It means that we've recognized our mistakes, apologize for them and are ready to fix them and do the work to lead the church into the next stage of our faith life together as a community of God.

March Adult Forum

March 4: "What about Kate?" Last fall we learned a lot about Martin Luther, but what about his wife? Kate was a multi-talented woman. She was a business woman, a lay theologian, a healing practitioner and more. How did she help to shape Luther's views of marriage? Come to learn more about this fascinating person, who was a forerunner of the modern woman.

March 11: "An American Conscience" part 1. This is a PBS documentary that explores the life and work of theologian Reinhold Niebuhr. His work spanned from WWI through the Vietnam War era, but his reflections are as relevant today as they were decades ago. Niebuhr's writings and political activism influenced the thinking of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and US presidents from Jimmy Carter to Barack Obama. Come to learn and share how this vibrant voice for justice speaks to us today.

March 18: "An American Conscience" part 2. The second part of this PBS documentary deals with the later work of theologian Reinhold Niebuhr. After WWII, he called for a change of Christian attitudes toward Jews, and Niebuhr's calls for justice served to influence Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and the Civil Rights Movement. Throughout these decades he warned the nation against the sin of pride and served as a an advisor to the State Department. How does this voice for justice speak to us today? Come to learn and share your thoughts. You are welcome even if you missed part 1.
