ASH WEDNESDAY IS FEB. 22

It's time. It is time to bring in your palms from behind the pictures and over the doors in your homes. Each Palm Sunday we give everyone palm branches to put up, over a door, or behind a picture, or a mirror, as a reminder that Jesus is the Lord. Then in the month before Lent, we bring them back to church and on Fat Tuesday, they are burned in preparation for Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is the day when we begin a season of self-examination and confession with the sign of the cross made on our foreheads.

So please remember to bring your palm branches back to church. We will make the ashes on Fat Tuesday, Feb. 28. Gustavus Adolphus will be invited to join us for our Ash Wednesday Service at 6:30 p.m.

FROM THE PASTOR

UNDER THE SIGN OF THE CROSS:

Throughout our lives we travel with a hidden cross. It is the cross traced upon our forehead, with the waters of baptism. The water evaporates quickly but the cross remains, for in the waters of baptism we are "sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross forever."

So we travel through life under the sign of an invisible cross, but one day a year that cross becomes visible again. Traced with the ashes of last year's palm, the sign of the cross is retraced as we are reminded that in life, and in death, the cross remains. Although we are dust and to dust we shall return, we are now and always shall be sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever.

The sign of the cross then, is a powerful reminder of who we are and whose we are. In fact it is so powerful that Martin Luther suggested that we hold onto making the sign of the cross as part of our daily life. In section 7 of the small catechism on morning and evening prayer, Luther wrote "In the morning, when you rise, make the sign of the cross and say, 'In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Amen'." Likewise, Luther instructed that evening prayers at bedtime, begin the same way. Make the sign of the cross and say, "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen" (page 353 of the Book of Concord).

That is something I was not taught in confirmation, nor was it emphasized in seminary. So I guess it is no wonder many who were raised as Lutherans know so little about the importance of the cross in our daily lives and at worship. Nevertheless, Martin Luther intended that it be part of our daily routine, and that is why I am so grateful that it is coming back into our life, not just in strong Roman Catholic towns like Albany, Minn., but across our whole church.

So, for you who were raised as Catholics, keep on doing what you are doing in making the sign of the cross, and for those of you, like myself, who did not grow up with this practice, give it a try. Use it to begin your table prayers, your morning prayers and your evening prayers. Also, anytime you see the symbol of a red cross in your hymn book on the screen remember, that is a reminder to make the sign of the cross. Once we get past the awkwardness of trying something unfamiliar to us, I think we will find a blessing in this practice as we remember who we are, and whose we are.

- Pastor Steve will be collecting unused medical supplies and used mobility devices to donate to Global Health Ministries.
- Al Erickson for the Stewardship Committee reported additional pledges received with the total now estimated at \$187,700. He encourages everyone to return their pledge cards as soon as possible. This information is used for the 2023 budget.
- A draft of the 2023 budget was presented. It currently reflects a deficit of approximately \$49,000. Treasurer Diane Langer will be presenting the budget to the congregation on Jan. 22 after the service. Discussion will follow her presentation. The congregation will vote on the budget during the annual meeting on Jan. 29.
- The council discussed moving forward with a redevelopment/ revitalization plan. A presentation to the congregation will be made on Sunday, Jan. 15 during the coffee time.
- Karen Matthes, Nominating Committee, brought two names forward for the open council positions: Kathy Halvorson and Patrick Kutzer. Their names will be presented at the annual meeting on Jan. 29.
- The Jan. 29 annual meeting will be held in person right after the service. A Zoom link will be available for any out-of-town members. Please contact the office for the Zoom information.
