# FROM THE PASTOR

## THE POWER OF THE RESURRECTION

As we prepare to celebrate our first Easter season together, I am reminded of a story\* about what occurred in Russia during the 1920s when communism was moving across the land and closing down all the churches. They tried many tactics, including "eliminating the Sunday, the Lord's Day, by instituting a six-day week, then an eight-day week."

One Easter morning a Lutheran church was targeted. The communist officials marched in during the start of the service, took over the pulpit, and announced communism as the new religion. The superstitions of Christianity were on their way out. Naive people had been deluded long enough by this ridiculous myth. Then out of sympathy they turned to the old German Lutheran pastor and said, "Now, do you have anything to say in defense of yourself." What the communists did not know was that the liturgy and tradition were deeply imbedded in the congregation.

On occasion, this elderly pastor had a habit of going to the altar on Sunday mornings, bowing, turning to the congregation, and announcing in a loud voice, "He is risen!" Whenever he did this the congregation would jump to their feet and respond enthusiastically, "He has risen indeed!"

And so, without a word the pastor moved over to the chancel, bowed, and proclaimed, "He has risen!" Without missing a beat the congregation rose to their feet and responded with an enthusiastic roar, "He has risen indeed!"

Then the pastor turned to the communists and said, "Now do you have anything to say in defense of yourselves?"

The power of the resurrection—building bridges, opening doors.

## TREASURER REPORT: YTD MARCH 1

Mt. Carmel is on a positive road towards our goal to erase our faithfully passed deficit budget of (\$43,368.00).

Last year gave us many blessings enabling us to end 2022 with a positive of \$19,170.30 which was carried forward into 2023, after facing a budget deficit of (\$62,709.00).

A reminder that we again have opportunities available as an avenue to recover. The Mt. Carmel Foundation has pledged an initial gift of \$6,100 for specified areas of the budget. In addition, they will gift up to an additional \$5,000 in a \$1 for \$2 matching fund challenge for all special gifts above pledged giving by June 30. Meaning if we raise \$10,000 in additional special gifts, the foundation will gift an additional \$5,000. With the Mt. Carmel Foundation gifts, we potentially could erase \$21,100 of the deficit by June 30.



# RACIAL JUSTICE BOOK STUDY

The racial justice book study group will be starting a new book shortly and we invite you to learn with us. We just completed Kent Nerburn's book "Neither Wolf Nor Dog" where we met Dan, a tribal elder who, coming up to the end if his life, has things he wants to say. The book "tells the story of two men, one white and one Indian, locked in their own understandings yet struggling to find a common voice." As with all the books we have read and discussed we learned much that opened our eyes and our hearts to perspectives different from our own.

We will be starting the second book in this series "The Wolf at Twilight" which will take us into the history of the Indian boarding schools. As one Native American man said "Oh, I learned. I can speak English, I became a Christian, but it changed me. I am no longer myself, I am someone else."

## ONE-FOR-TWO CHALLENGE

#### What is the challenge?

The Foundation would like to match 1-for-2 on special gifts to the church over and above what has been pledged for the purpose of erasing the budget deficit.

#### How much can we raise?

If we give \$10,000 by June 30, the Foundation will add \$5,000 for a total of \$15,000 towards erasing the deficit.
