CHANGES TO ONLINE STREAMING

As Mt. Carmel's worship tech grows and evolves, we are finding that streaming through Facebook Live has consistent issues with quality and stability. A bigger issue is Facebook's requirement to manage organizational pages with personal log ins. Beginning in July, that means each person managing Sunday morning streaming will have to log in and out of their personal Facebook accounts for each service.

In order to provide the best streaming option for our worshippers and a single log in for our tech team, we have decided to broadcast live worship only on YouTube beginning July 2. Our last Facebook Live stream will be Sunday, June 25.

FIRST READING

God desires steadfast love Hosea 5:15—6:6

Because God's people have trusted in military powers and not God, today's reading begins with the surprising declaration that God will withdraw from Israel and Judah. Perhaps then, the people will recognize their sin and repent. God does not desire pious prayers, but a life of committed action that results in the living out of the covenant.

I will return again to my place until they acknowledge their guilt and seek my face. In their distress they will beg my favor:

^{6:1} Come, let us return to the LORD; for it is he who has torn, and he will heal us; he has struck down, and he will bind us up.

²After two days he will revive us; on the third day he will raise us up, that we may live before him.

³Let us know, let us press on to know the LORD; his appearing is as sure as the dawn; he will come to us like the showers, like the spring rains that water the earth."

⁴What shall I do with you, O Ephraim? What shall I do with you, O Judah? Your love is like a morning cloud, like the dew that goes away early.

⁵Therefore I have hewn them by the prophets, I have killed them by the words of my mouth, and my judgment goes forth as the light.

⁶For I desire steadfast love and not sacrifice, the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings.

SECOND READING

The faith of Abraham

Romans 4:13-25

In his letter to the Romans, Paul develops the idea that people are made right with God through faith rather than obedience to the law. To illustrate, he uses here the example of Abraham, whose trust in God's promise is what marks him as righteous.

Paul writes to the church at Rome:

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham

(for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") — in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." 19He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. 20 No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.



For I have come to call not the righteous but sinners."

¹⁸While he was saying these things to them, suddenly a leader of the synagogue came in and knelt before him, saying, "My daughter has just died; but come and lay your hand on her, and she will live." ¹⁹And Jesus got up and followed him, with his disciples. ²⁰Then suddenly a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years came up behind him and touched the fringe of his cloak, ²¹for she said to herself, "If I only touch his cloak, I will be made well." ²²Jesus turned, and seeing her he said, "Take heart, daughter; your faith has made you well." And instantly the woman was made well. ²³When Jesus came to the leader's house and saw the flute players and the crowd making a commotion, ²⁴he said, "Go away; for the girl is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. ²⁵But when the crowd had been put outside, he went in and took her by the hand, and the girl got up. ²⁶And the report of this spread throughout that district.

New Summer Worship Pattern

Our SummerFeast Holy Communion pattern begins this week. Service music is from ELW setting 3 (a familiar LBW setting). The Gathering is inspired by the daily Morning Prayer service and begins with remembrance of Baptism. Confession and the thematic prayer of the day are included the Prayers of the Church (Intercessions), and the Apostles' Creed is omitted except on festivals. Assembly responses to the readings and prayers are fresh for the season. The appointed psalm is prayed in the Gathering rather than between the readings, and concludes with a doxology and either the appropriate psalm prayer or Luther's Morning Prayer. In this non-festival time a simpler Great Thanksgiving is used. The Worship & Music team and staff hope that this variation inspires your summer worship and reflection on the Lord's Day in fresh ways.
