Christ is God's covenant with all creation

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

The Sundays in Lent this year lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures (first reading) and to use them as lenses through which to view holy baptism (gospel reading).

February 18	The covenant with Noah (Gen. 9:8-17)
February 25	The covenant with Abraham and Sara (Gen. 17:1-7, 15-16)
March 3	The covenant (commandments) at Sinai (Ex. 20:1-17)
March 10	The covenant renewal (lifting up of the serpent) (Num. 21:4-9)
March 17	A new covenant written on the heart (Jer. 31-31-34)

The rainbow, sign of God's covenant

Genesis 9:8–17

Today's reading is the conclusion to the flood story. Because of human sin, the Lord destroys the earth by flood, saving only Noah, his family, and the animals on the ark. Yet divine destruction gives way to divine commitment. As in the first creation, God blesses humanity and establishes a covenant with all creatures.

God said to Noah and to his sons with him, 9 "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, ¹⁰and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. ¹¹I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." 12God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: ¹³I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." ¹⁷God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

1 Peter 3:18–22

marks our new life in Christ.

Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. ²¹And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you — not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²²who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and

powers made subject to him.



WORSHIP LIFE

Lent: a sense of the season

The word Lent means *springtime*. This word comes from the same root as *lengthen*. Daytime lengthens during Lent. The northern hemisphere turns toward the sun, the source of life, and winter turns into spring. In Hebrew, the word for repentance is the same as the word that means to turn, like the turning of the earth to the sun, like the turning of the soil before planting.

"Even now, says the Lord, turn to me." (Joel 2:12) We are called to turn from our separate selves to come together in community. Spiritual disciplines are the way we express our repentance. In the lengthening brightness from Ash Wednesday until Holy Thursday afternoon, our holy Lent, we turn to God as our source of life. The disciplines of Lent are threefold, advises Matthew's gospel. We pray: "Go to your room, close your door, and pray" We fast: "No one must see you are fasting but [God]." We give alms as acts of love: "Keep your deeds of mercy secret." Through the Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting and acts of love, we spring-clean our lives, sharpen our senses, put tomorrow in its place, and treasure the day at hand.

Why are there forty days in Lent? It took forty days for sinfulness to drown in the flood before a new creation could inherit the earth. It took forty years for the generation of the Exodus to die before their descendants could enter the promised land. For forty days Moses and Elijah and Jesus fasted and prayed to prepare themselves for a life's work. Lent's forty days are a tithe (10%) of the year. Lent is the forty days of final preparation before the Easter baptisms. The already baptized can share the excitement and the struggles

of the candidates and rediscover the meaning of baptism in their own lives. During the forty days, both candidates and the faithful journey together to the baptismal font.

If we count the days, we will see that to get 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, Sundays must be excluded. They are the Lord's Day, weekly celebrations of the resurrection even within our Lenten discipline. On Sundays in Lent we will gather around Jesus in word and supper with alleluias put away for the season. Confession and absolution will take a larger role. Let us keep Lent together. "For now is the acceptable time! Now is the day of salvation!"
