Third Sunday in Lent

March 3, 2024 + 9:30 am *The cleansing of the temple*

Learn Live and Share God's Word

Jesus is our temple

The third covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the central one of Israel's history: the gift of the law to those God freed from slavery. The ten commandments are one of the chief parts of Luther's catechism, a core piece of baptismal instruction. They begin with the statement that because God alone has freed us from the powers that oppressed us, we are to let nothing else claim first place in our lives. When Jesus throws the merchants out of the temple, he is defending the worship of God alone and rejecting the ways commerce and profit-making can become our gods.

The Sundays in Lent this year lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures (first reading) and to use them as lenses through which to view holy baptism (gospel reading).

February 25	The covenant with Abraham and Sara (Gen. 17:1-7, 15-16)
March 3	The covenant (commandments) at Sinai (Ex. 20:1-17)
March 10	The covenant renewal (lifting up of the serpent) (Num. 21:4-9)
March 17	A new covenant written on the heart (Jer. 31-31-34)

FIRST READING

Exodus 20:1-17

The commandments given at Sinai

After escaping from slavery, the Israelites come to Mount Sinai, where God teaches them how to live in community. The ten commandments proclaim that God alone is worthy of worship. Flowing from God, the life of the community flourishes when based on honesty, trust, fidelity, and respect for life, family, and property.

God spoke all these words:

²I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; ³you shall have no other gods before me.

⁴You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. ⁵You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, ⁶but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

⁷You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

⁸Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. ⁹Six days you shall labor and do all your work. ¹⁰But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work — you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. ¹¹For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

¹²Honor your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving you.

¹³You shall not murder.

¹⁵You shall not steal.

¹⁶You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 1:18–25

Christ crucified, the wisdom of God

The word of the cross is pure foolishness and nonsense to the world because it claims that God is mostly revealed in weakness, humiliation, and death. But through such divine foolishness and weakness, God is working to save us. The center of Paul's preaching is Christ crucified.

Paul writes to the church at Corinth:

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

²⁰Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?

²¹For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. ²²For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, ²³but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, ²⁴but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

John 2:13-22

Jesus attacks the commercialization of religion by driving merchants out of the temple. When challenged, he responds mysteriously, with the first prediction of his own death and resurrection. In the midst of a seemingly stable religious center, Jesus suggests that the center itself has changed.

The holy gospel according to John.

Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" ¹⁷His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." ¹⁸The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" ¹⁹Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." ²⁰The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" ²¹But he was speaking of the temple of his body. ²²After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

WORSTIP LIFE

Fasting, Prayer, and Acts of Love: The Disciplines of Lent

Part 2: Prayer

Lent means spring. This is a season for a new awakening and for spring house-cleaning. It means cleaning out the dust and grime of a long, dark winter. The rags and dust mops and brooms of that house-cleaning are the tools called fasting, prayer, and acts of love. We fast for the good of our bodies. We pray for the good of our relationship with God. We give alms and offer acts of love for the good of our sisters and brothers. These tools are always "for the *good* of" something. These age-old disciplines reflect our most fundamental concerns: our relationship with God (prayer), with our bodies (fasting), and with each other (acts of love).

This week – the Lenten discipline of prayer.

We pray for the good of our relationship with God. Lenten prayer restores neglected communication channels, listens for where God is calling us, frees us to cast all our cares on God.

"Who we are is how we pray," says one book about prayer life and personality. There is no single way to engage in the Lenten discipline of prayer. Personality shapes the forms of prayer we find meaningful or helpful. So do our life circumstances. Some people prefer to pray in groups, others pray alone. Some prefer to use various fine arts to guide their prayer, others Scripture, or devotional writings. Some prefer to pray using their whole bodies or surrounded by natural environments, others do not.

One of the more positive developments of our times is the rebirth of the tradition of spiritual direction. Wise and holy men and women agree to become "soul friends" to other Christians discerning God's will in their lives. One of the most important questions in this spiritual walk is this: "What is the deepest desire of your heart?" The question is not so easily answered. What first pops to mind is invariably found to be a secondary or tertiary desire rooted in a deeper and more fundamental one.

Use these days of Lent to deepen your relationship with God. Every human relationship needs loving care, attention, maintenance, refreshment. Experiment with new ways to pray or recommit yourself to a favorite form that's fallen by the wayside during the last year. Return to a favorite book or a favorite "sacred space." "What is the deepest desire of your heart?"
