#### Look to Christ to live

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith, for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

The Sundays in Lent this year lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures (first reading) and to use them as lenses through which to view holy baptism (gospel reading).

February 25	The covenant with Abraham and Sara (Gen. 17:1-7, 15-16)
March 3	The covenant (commandments) at Sinai (Ex. 20:1-17)

## FIRST READING

#### The lifting up of the serpent

#### Numbers 21:4–9

Though God provides food and water for the Israelites in the wilderness, they whine and grumble. They forget about the salvation they experienced in the exodus. God punishes them for their sin, but when they repent God also provides a means of healing: a bronze serpent lifted up on a pole.

From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. <sup>5</sup>The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." <sup>6</sup>Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. <sup>7</sup>The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us."

So Moses prayed for the people. <sup>8</sup>And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." <sup>9</sup>So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

## SECOND READING

#### Alive in Christ

#### Ephesians 2:1–10

While we were dead in our sinfulness, God acted to make us alive as a gift of grace in Christ Jesus. We are saved not by what we do but by grace through faith. Thus our good works are really a reflection of God's grace at work in our lives.

You were dead through the trespasses and sins <sup>2</sup>in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. <sup>3</sup>All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else.

<sup>4</sup>But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us <sup>5</sup>even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ — by grace you have been saved — <sup>6</sup>and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, <sup>7</sup>so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. <sup>8</sup>For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God — <sup>9</sup>not the result of works, so that no one may boast. <sup>10</sup>For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

WORSHIP LIFE

*Fasting, Prayer, and <u>Acts of Love</u> The Disciplines of Lent* 

#### Part 3: Acts of Love

Lent means spring. This is a season for a new awakening and for spring house-cleaning. It means cleaning out the dust and grime of a long, dark winter. The rags and dust mops and brooms of that house-cleaning are the tools called **fasting**, **prayer**, **and acts of love**. We fast for the good of our bodies. We pray for the good of our relationship with God. We give alms and offer acts of love for the good of our sisters and brothers. These tools are always "for the *good* of" something. These age-old disciplines reflect our most fundamental concerns: our relationship with God (prayer), with our bodies (fasting), and with each other (acts of love).

#### *This week – acts of love.*

This third discipline of Lent has traditionally been called almsgiving. But it's a word that doesn't mean much to us anymore. The poor box. The widow's mite. The little graphic below shows a gift of money – alms. But aside from being a dusty word, we can also think differently about this Lenten discipline. We give alms and offer acts of love for the good of our sisters and brothers. Sometimes the sacrifice is larger if we offer our valuable time; if we become emotionally involved; if we go beyond dropping our spare change into an alms box. But whether it is through gifts of time, talent, or treasure this Lenten journey is a time to strengthen our relationships with one another – and especially with the least of those among us – for it is there where Christ has promised also to be. A gift to alleviate hunger, generated

from your Lenten fasting, a gift to the hunger ministries for your Lenten supper, or to ELCA World Hunger, or disaster relief can be a way to keep a Holy Lent.
