FIRST READING

My messenger is a refiner and purifier

Malachi 3:1-4

The Lord announces a covenant with Israel. A messenger like Malachi (his name means "my messenger") shall prepare the way for the coming of the Lord by purifying and refining God's people, as silver and gold are refined.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the LORD whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight--indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ²But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

PSALMODY

Luke 1:68-79 (ICEL)

In the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us. (1:78)

The canticle of Zechariah or Benedictus is one of the three canticles (Biblical songs) in the first two chapels of Luke, the others being the "Magnificat" (canticle of Mary) and the "Nunc dimittis" (Lord, now let your servant...). The

Benedictus was the song of thanksgiving uttered by Zechariah at the circumcision of his son, John the baptizer. The canticle received its name from its first words in Latin ("Benedictus Dominus Deus Israel", "Blessed be the Lord God of Israel"). It is sung daily in liturgical morning prayer (Matins).

- A Blessed are you, Lord, the God of Israel, you have come to your people and set them free.
- C You have raised up for us a mighty Savior, born of the house of your servant David.
- A Through your holy prophets, you promised of old to save us from our enemies, from the hands of all who hate us,
- C to show mercy to our forebears, and to remember your holy covenant.
- A This was the oath you swore to our father Abraham: to set us free from the hands of our enemies,
- C free to worship you without fear, holy and righteous before you, all the days of our life.
- A And you, child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare the way,
- C to give God's people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins.
- A In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us,
- C to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

SECOND READING

Philippians 1:3-11

A harvest of righteousness on the day of Jesus Christ The apostle Paul was the pastor of many new churches. He writes in this letter about his joy to be in partnership with the Christians of Philippi. Listen to how tender-hearted Paul, sometimes a stern preacher, is with his friends as he encourages them to grow in love and knowledge.

Paul writes to the church at Philippi:

I thank my God every time I remember you, ⁴constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, ⁵because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus.

⁹And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

John the Baptist is a herald of the saving Lord, whose way is prepared by "repentance for the forgiveness of sins." As we hear the careful record of human leaders, we sense the spectrum of political and religious authority that will be challenged by this coming Lord.
